Chairperson's Report

Good afternoon and welcome to Notting Neighbourhood House AGM 2018. It's always a pleasure to see our neighbours, partners and community collaborators at our AGM. Neighbourhood Houses are always about the people and recognising this support is a core function of our AGM.

Our major events have been great opportunities to create a community atmosphere in the House and bring families together. The Christmas celebration, Halloween party and our Open Day were a great success. Tracey our coordinator has written an excellent report of some of the highlights of our house in the past 12 months.

Overall, however, 2018 has been a challenging year. Notting Hill is rapidly changing with an influx of young families from diverse communities replacing many older residents as they pass on or move away. As a result our challenge is to:

Develop the strategies and programs that will meet the needs of our incoming residents and

Continue to evolve programs that encourage our existing residents to be part of our House

In fact the change in demographics has already started to be reflected in the House with some of the most popular activities being play group activities for younger children.

An important part of this process has been a collaboration with Monash Council Place Officer Colin Bostock to be part of public meetings to identify what projects the community would like to see and how the Council and our House can be part of the solution.

One of outcomes has been strong community support for a proposal to upgrade the children's playground next to the house. As a result the House has put forward a concept in the State Government Pick My Project competition to create a community BBQ /Picnic area. The plan also includes a border of fruit trees and a raised garden bed for herbs and seasonal vegetables.

We believe this project will offer an excellent place for community groups, family groups and friends to just be together. In addition the gardening elements are part of our overall strategic plan to encourage a more sustainable lifestyle in the community. We hope this can form part of ongoing classes or activity groups.

Another community-inspired initiative in progress is the creation of a street library which will be located outside the front door of the house. Street libraries offer everyone the opportunity to take and give books freely. We will incorporate children's books in the library as well as material from a range of cultural groups. Again this venture offers extra opportunities for people to interact with each other and our Neighbourhood House. Many thanks to Margaret and Robin Blair who have been exceptionally supportive of this initiative and Monash Council who have also supported it through the community grants program.

Thanks and acknowledgements

Throughout the year many volunteers have assisted with activities, administration and events. A Coordinator can only do so much. In truth the success of the House lies in the hands of the community that supports it. Thank you for your support.

Thanks also to the tutors who run the classes and activities throughout the year. It is their skill and enthusiasm that inspires people to come, stay and help create the buzz around the house.

Thanks also to our community partners: The Telugu Foundation, the 2514 Muthuhara Melbourne Children's society and Mahamevnawa Buddist Meditation who all offer excellent cultural programs and are important elements in the success of the House.

'THANK YOU LYNN'

What made Lynn Elder tick.

Lynn has always been involved in her local community during her 30 years living in nearby East Oakleigh with a deep passion for the well-being of individuals and families. Lynn's foray into the not-forprofit sector began by accident when she was working for Anglicare Victoria in Clayton in an administrative role which morphed into an acting Neighbourhood House Coordinator in 2010 at Dixon House in the City of Monash. This led to more than three years running a very busy, multi-cultural community hub that was much loved by a diverse range of people. Volunteers formed the backbone of this organisation and Lynn moved into a new role within Anglicare as Volunteer Manager of several emergency relief sites including Clayton and the Western suburbs until 2016.

Lynn has seen first-hand the needs of many in our community.

These are people who struggle with a broad range of issues ranging from financial disadvantage, family violence, housing and food insecurity. Many are refugees trying to settle in a new country after escaping traumatic conditions in their homeland.

For these people the opportunity to access the various activities that a neighbourhood house has to offer is invaluable. This can range from English as a second language, homework clubs, material aid, women's groups, computer classes and social activities.

Lynn came on board the COM at Notting Hill Neighbourhood House over two years ago at the request of the then sector networker Merial who recognised her skills from her coordinator days. She is excited about the potential that this house has and hopes it continues to grow and become an important community hub in Notting Hill.

Treasurer's Report

NHCA incurred an operating surplus of \$1,188.00 in 2017-18 (FY18) compare to deficit of \$1,670.00 in 2016-17 (FY17).

Total income for the Financial Year is \$119,427.00. Income for FY18 was primarily driven by:

Grants: \$73,191 (State Gov NHCP \$60,391 Monash Operational \$9,300, and other grants \$3,500) Hall Hire: \$16,767 (income generated by leasing NHNH hall to various groups and individuals) Class Fees: \$10,292 (income generated through various activities, and classes run by NHNH) University Student Placement; \$7,500 (related to support and guidance for student placement)

Income for FY18 is down by \$2,970 compare to FY17, driven by lower class fees (\$5,432), lower University Student Placement (\$5,000), lower Hall Hire fees (\$3,383), offset by high other income (\$8,721), higher grants (\$1,685), and higher fundraising (\$1,347)

Operating Expenses are down (by \$12,518) lower contractors and deprecation.

Payroll expenses are up (by \$6,812) due to biannual pay review of NHNH staff, Superannuation dues from previous year (due to legislation changes) and Work Cover Premium dues from previous to keep the cover in line with the wages.

NHNH Cash at Bank for FY18 was \$38,688 (down by \$15,527 compare to FY17). Key drivers for lower Cash at Bank position are:

Lower Income by \$2,970 Higher Payroll expenses by \$6,812 Long Service Leave payout \$6,066

NHCA's Financial Position shows slightly higher Total Equity for FY18 of \$32,466 (up by \$1,188 compare to FY17).

The Committee would like to thank all NHCA stakeholders for their contributions and commitments to the organisation. With the strong support of Management Board, staff and volunteers as well as community members, NHCA seeks to continue offering excellent services and develop program initiatives to constantly deliver value back to the community.

Coordinator's Report

Community Activities / Events:

2017-2018 witnessed community coming together for all kinds of different events, some traditional such as our Fun Food Fridays, but also some special cultural inspired....

Community Vertical Garden - continues to thrive, actually at times it appears to be jungle like. That all said, locals continue to gather bits and bobs for their garden, while others have planted a few new plants. Earlier in the year, we had our Clever Sprouts Children plant an array of flowering annuals, all looked beautiful and bloom.

Yoga Workshop and Talk - working with the Telugu Language and Culture Foundation of Australia, we presented Lenish John, renowned Indian yoga guru present a free yoga workshop, and Dr. Prerna Sharma to talk about Ayurvedic medicine practices and benefits. This program was one of intimacy and close connection, whereby people came together to engage in new ways of thinking and healthy practices.

Set in the warmth of late afternoon, locals came together to chat, buy a few last minute presents and share a meal. Lovely way to end 2017.

NHNH Open Day - was a time whereby locals came together, shared a chat over the BBQ, spoke with our staff about upcoming/future events and about our organisational direction. Kids were treated to fun activities such as drawing, face painting, a huge Jumping Castle and other treats. It was a fun day had by all.

NHNH new Fence - we would like to thank Monash Council for providing a newly created, and much more enticing fence with additional gates to NHNH. As all have noticed the fence is a lot shorter, providing greater visuals to NHNH and with the addition of the Samada street and the Westerfield Shop gate, easier access.

Community Library - although not up and running, we have begun measures to integrate a small community street library to NHNH.
